



NO BOUNDS

Robert Robinson, DDS, grew up in St. Bernard Parish, just four miles from New Orleans' bustling French Quarter. He lived in a one-story home, surrounded by friends, family, and his tightly knit Baptist church community—far removed from the Louisiana known for its tourists and traveling jazz acts.

When Hurricane Katrina hit, St. Bernard Parish again proved a distinctly different world. Ninety percent of Dr. Robinson's humble county, compared to 9 percent of the French Quarter, was destroyed.

"I had to start a new life, in a sense," says

Dr. Robinson. The storm forced his family to Houston,
where they lived for a year and a half before they
could go home—to a new house, a new high school,
and a newfound sense of what it means to overcome
hardship. "It was a shock," he says. "It made me grow."

Dr. Robinson was no stranger to difficulty. At the age of 6, he was badly burned in a fire set by a neighbor. Through the healing process, however, he found hope. "I had one doctor who stood out to me. I remember him telling me I was progressing really well. He was so encouraging," he says of the oral surgeon who helped him recover—and inspired him to pursue the field of dentistry.

Dr. Robinson had an unshakeable foundation, and nothing could destroy that.

"Something that always motivated me was knowing where I came from," Dr. Robinson says. Today, the 2018 Creighton graduate is the first male African-American dentist from the St. Bernard Parish region. He plans to use his experiences to grow the field and inspire other students of color to pursue careers in dentistry.

Dr. Robinson credits his Creighton mentors for helping him navigate the initial hurdles of dental school and pushing him to succeed. He is grateful for the multiple scholarships that allowed him to follow his dream of becoming a dentist.

"I am so thankful for their support. School can be very expensive and challenging, but it's so important to get out and be committed to helping others. Seeing others influence my education has shown me how important it is to give back."

GIVING OUR STUDENTS MORE

Laura Brown's favorite time of year in the School of Dentistry is from June through Halloween. June is the month that the third-year dental students begin to learn their way around the clinic. By Halloween, they're able to take the theory of what they learned in their first two years and apply it to patient care.

"After two years of intense classroom learning, these students begin, in starts and fits, to use their knowledge to treat our patient population," says Dr. Brown, assistant professor and chair of the department of periodontics. "It is wonderful to watch a group of young, intelligent professionals as they begin to develop their clinical problem-solving and treatment skills. Few dental schools offer students the kind of clinical experience that Creighton does. They learn a lot more here because they do a lot more here."

Brown came to the School of Dentistry in June of 2018, bringing with her a wealth of experience. She served as a Dental Officer in the United States Navy for four years and was in private practice in the Kansas City area for 15 years. She taught part-time at the University of Missouri – Kansas City before coming to Creighton, where she is one of the many talented instructors striving to give our students a dental education like no other.

Recently, Brown performed a tissue graft on a patient and was assisted/observed by three dental students, one who will begin his Advanced Education in Periodontics residency after graduation this May. "He watched each step and was so interested," Brown says. "I saw the synapses firing. It was such a joy to watch him absorb the moment."

"Being at Creighton is a joy. I love working here. The School of Dentistry gives us the time to do our work and focus on our students and patients. And it's such an exciting time for the school right now. I wouldn't want to be anywhere else."

OUR FACULTY HELPS ELEVATE TEACHING AND THE PROFESSION TO NEW HEIGHTS.

Building a strong faculty starts with hiring advanced, adaptable professionals. However, to develop leaders who can elevate our curriculum, teach lessons instilled with our Jesuit, Catholic beliefs, and inspire students' passions for the dental arts, we must provide access to new technology, research methods, and opportunities to evolve.

Your investment helps us hire passionate leaders who inspire our students to question what dentistry can accomplish for the future of health care when human compassion comes into play.

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TECHNOLOGY NEED:

CEREC Machines

Using our 22 Ceramic Reconstruction, or "CEREC" machines, our faculty and students practice real patient care using sophisticated design systems to build high-quality, metalfree dental restorations in a single visit.

TECHNOLOGY NEED:

Cone Beam

Dental Cone Beam Computed Technology, or CT scans, are using diagnostic imaging when traditional dental X-rays are insufficient. A CT scan can discover pathologies in the jaw bones and surrounding structures.



The Jesuit, Catholic beliefs infused in our curriculum encourage us to strive for more in all we do.

That includes providing our students with the most modern oral care equipment available.

Through the introduction of our new dental facility, our faculty, students, and researchers work with today's most technologically advanced software and equipment. But unveiling this new technology is only the first step. We must continue to upgrade and expand access to this technology. We must train students and faculty to use it to serve our patients effectively.

Associate Professor Tom Berry, BS, DDS, says the shift toward technology is the biggest trend he's seen across dentistry, from computerized charts to equipment and materials. He sees technology like the CEREC machine becoming more favorable to dentists because it lowers costs and saves time for the patient. "If we can provide that service and give our students access to this technology—that's just invaluable."

Invaluable in the clinic and the classroom. Laura C. Barritt, BS, PhD, professor and chair of oral biology, says students in her histology course are now able to collaborate better through the addition of virtual microscopy, which allows students to see the same slide on screen at once, instead of taking turns looking at glass slides through light microscopes. Such a change might seem minor, but Dr. Barritt says technological updates like this are a game-changer.

Scott Radniecki, BS'08, DDS'12, assistant professor and director of the dental clinic's emergency services, says about 4 in 5 Creighton dental students will go into private practice, where they will immediately need to know how to use the latest in digital dental technology. To continue graduating the comprehensive and well-rounded dentists Creighton is known for, he said, an investment in technology (and training for faculty to effectively teach that technology) will be essential.



"The technology of our profession changes so frequently that software and equipment will often be obsolete in just a few years. For our graduates to know how to use the latest technology in everyday practice, they need to learn it as students. They will be practice-ready only if we continue to keep Creighton at the cutting edge."
