BEFORE FRESHMAN YEAR:

Chinen didn't even know about research as a potential path. Creighton paved the way to that discovery and many more.

Chinen's main research project at Creighton—which she presented at the BIG EAST Research Symposium in New York City this year—explored how individuals with cerebral palsy respond differently to physical therapy interventions. Her project showed that the same treatment strategies don't work for everyone and further methods should be explored. Chinen also conducted research on patients with Down syndrome to investigate early brain changes associated with Alzheimer's disease and dementia.

"At Creighton, I've seen firsthand how research helps us better understand how to care for the whole person and produce the best outcomes for everyone," she said.

IN 2023, then-adjunct professor Preheim challenged Shafack and his classmates to each start a new company from scratch in eight weeks.

"That one project alone was worth the price of my Creighton tuition," Shafack said. "And I had so many other great experiences at Creighton, as well."

For his business, Shafack teamed up with a few other students to found NIYOU, which helps student-athletes navigate Name, Image and Likeness (NIL) partnerships. The idea grew out of Shafack's work as a marketing intern in Athletics, where he'd gotten to know many of Creighton's 300 student-athletes. He saw that most of them didn't have time to think about securing sponsorships in addition to balancing class with practice, travel and competition. NIYOU could help them fill that gap.

For their first partnership, NIYOU connected players on the Creighton men's and women's basketball teams with a Raising Cane's sponsorship. In the years since, NIYOU's clients have expanded to other Creighton Athletics programs and student-athletes at other schools (University of Nebraska-Lincoln and University of Nebraska at Omaha), forming partnerships with Nissan of Omaha, Omaha Steaks, Dayspring Bank, Cobalt Credit Union, Invisalign and more.

As NIYOU's CEO, Shafack plans to remain in Omaha and expand his client base of student-athletes and brands as far as it can go, while also providing top-of-the-line service to the company's existing clients. He has a team of fellow Bluejays helping him do so, including new alumnus Sam Perkinson, BSBA'25, NIYOU co-founder and chief brand officer; and Kylie Karsky, BA'23, JD'27, NIYOU chief operations officer.

"We've been successful because of the many who have believed in and supported us," Shafack said. "In addition to the wonderful education I received, I have been able to join the Creighton network, which is second to none. There are so many professors, alumni and members of the business community in Omaha and all over the U.S. who are using their experience and connections to help Creighton students like me grow and succeed."

New Donor-funded Scholarships and Opportunities

- Mary Pat (Statz) McCarthy, BSBA'77, and Kevin McCarthy, BSBA'75, established the McCarthy Endowed Scholarship to be awarded to Phoenix students in the School of Medicine, College of Nursing, and the School of Pharmacy and Health Professions' pharmacy program.
- The estates of alumnus **Dr. Elno Zikmund**, BS'41, and his wife, **Tillie Zikmund**, invested more than \$10 million in the **Elno T. and Mathilda M. Zikmund** Endowed Scholarship. The scholarship is unrestricted, meaning it can support Creighton students in all schools and colleges.



EVERY DAY AT CREIGHTON,

Cassidy Nipp walked with the Jesuits spiritually. Sometimes she jogged with them, too.

For years, Nipp met her friend Fr. Larry Gillick, SJ (or "Fr. G" as she calls the longtime Creighton Jesuit) weekly in the Kiewit Fitness Center to go for a run. To guide Fr. Gillick (who is blind) around the indoor track, Nipp would tie their wrists together so they could run side by side.

"We talk about everything on these runs," Nipp said. "About God, life updates, the lessons we're learning in life, all the highs and lows. Fr. G's Jesuit perspective has shown me how to embrace the messiness of being an imperfect human and how to extend grace to everyone around me. Our runs are the purest form of accompaniment I have ever known."

For Nipp, every aspect of her Creighton experience was so perfectly intertwined: the curriculum and clinicals of her nursing degree, the service and spirituality of the donor-supported, mission-driven programs she joined. Even, as pictured, her faith and physical fitness found common ground. "It all came together for me at Creighton. The things I've learned here and the relationships I've formed, I'll carry them with me for the rest of my life."

Through Campus Ministry, Nipp found a like-minded faith community, with prayer groups, weekly reflections and regular retreats that carried her through her four years at Creighton. "All these moments taught me how to receive God's goodness, deepen my faith and encounter the world through the lens of Ignatian spirituality," Nipp said.

Schlegel Center for Service and Justice trips shaped Nipp's understanding of what it means to serve. "It's not about going to a place and 'fixing it.' It's about immersing yourself in a community, walking alongside others, learning from them and maybe, in the process, finding new paths to making a difference in the world."

Since graduating, Nipp has been making *her* difference in the world as a pediatric nurse at Children's Nebraska in Omaha. She plans to return to Creighton again soon to join Fr. G for another run around the track.

Emerging Technologies Initiative

Google.org, Google's philanthropic arm, provided Creighton with a \$250,000 grant to support the University's efforts to prepare students for the rapidly expanding uses of artificial intelligence in all walks of work and life. The funding in Creighton Libraries' emerging technologies initiative will empower students, faculty and staff to engage with AI, employing it as a tool for learning and research while also exploring the ways it's reshaping the workforce across every field and industry.







Soto Nursing Scholars program

A gift from alumna **Kathy Keough Soto**, BSN'75, and her family created the Soto Nursing Scholars program within Creighton's College of Nursing and the Arrupe Global Scholars and Partnerships Program. Through the Soto Scholarship, BSN graduates will earn a Doctor of Nursing Practice degree while developing their skills in healthcare-deprived communities across the world.

"Creighton teaches nurses how to be empathetic and really get to know their patients so they can provide the best care for them," said Keough Soto. "The world needs more Creighton nurses."

Over seven years, multiple Soto Scholar cohorts of five licensed Bachelor of Science in Nursing graduates (25 total) will receive a full scholarship to earn a Doctor of Nursing Practice degree and certificate in global health at Creighton. During the three-year program, Soto Scholars will develop their skills in healthcare-deprived communities internationally.



The Samuel & Ida Kaiman Center for International Criminal Justice and Holocaust Studies

The Howard A. Kaiman, JD'67, Nuremberg to the Hague (N2H) Endowed Program

Every summer for more than a decade, the School of Law's N2H program has taken about 30 students to Germany, the Netherlands and Poland to learn firsthand about the Holocaust. The program immerses them in a series of historical and legal experiences, combining classroom instruction with trips to actual crime scenes.

This program is now endowed in perpetuity thanks to a \$2M gift from the estate of School of Law alumnus **Howard Kaiman**, who passed away at age 93. The Kaiman family's gift also established the Center for International Criminal Justice and Holocaust Studies in honor of Howard Kaiman's parents.

The Creighton Quad

The University broke ground on the Creighton Quad, 251,500 square feet of green space at the heart of academic and residential life, surrounded by three academic facilities and four residence halls, including the future sophomore residence hall currently under construction.

The beautified 5.7-acre quad—to be completed in fall 2026—will be utilized for signature campus events, including graduation, freshman orientation, alumni reunion weekends, as well as community use. This fully donor-funded project will mark the largest physical reshaping of campus in the University's history.





Softball and Baseball Fields

Creighton is building a new softball competition field (to be completed in fall 2025) and a baseball practice field (to open by June 2026) near Florence Boulevard and Cuming Street. The new homes of Creighton softball and baseball will also be available to community baseball and softball events. The baseball field will serve as the principal practice location for visiting College World Series teams. Both fields will be open to all Creighton students for intramural and club sports throughout the academic year.

The fields were made possible by support from the State of Nebraska's Shovel-Ready Fund and College World Series of Omaha, Inc.





The McGraw Family Indoor Golf Facility

Creighton Athletics opened a new state-of-the-art training center for the men's and women's golf teams. The nearly 4,000-square-foot performance center—located in the Kiewit Fitness Center—was designed to foster student-athlete development and set the stage for both programs' future success.

The elite training center was made possible by a \$500K gift from the family of Nicole and Mike McGraw. The McGraw family has long supported academic programs and Bluejay Athletics, a legacy that started with the late Jack McGraw, BS'53, and his wife, the late Joan McGraw.
